



The Secure and Convenient way to carry Travel Money - Cash Passport™

With a fondness for travel and family living overseas, Sue Nunan, 43 has become accustomed to handing over her hard earned cash in exchange for foreign currency. Yet the whole exchange process was something that Sue found a strain; even spending the money sometimes had its difficulties!

Sue embarks on frequent trips to the continent and further afield to the United States visiting friends and family. Up until three years ago, Sue would simply exchange all of her holiday money into foreign currency notes, putting cards to one side.

She said: "I haven't got any credit cards and the thought of taking my debit card abroad makes me feel uncomfortable. There's always the temptation to overspend - to go into your overdraft, but the amount of loose cash I was taking was becoming a worry".

In addition to steering clear of bank cards when abroad, Sue found traveller's cheques to be more hassle than they are worth. "It's true that traveller's cheques do offer security but the problem is not only that you first have to find somewhere to exchange them, but they're not accepted in many places - which is a complete nightmare!"

Over time, as Sue's trips away became longer, the amount of money needed for her stays increased. Often staying with her state-side friends for up to three months at a time, the security of her money is of paramount concern.

"It was actually the safety aspect that first sold the Cash Passport to me. If you lose the card [Cash Passport], you're safe in the knowledge that your money is still secure and protected".

For the past three years Sue has simply reloaded her Travelex Cash Passport each time before jetting off. In addition, because she makes trips to both Europe and America, Sue keeps one card for each territory and exchanges Sterling into both Euros and US Dollars on a regular basis.

"With the Cash Passport, it's accepted everywhere, so it's really flexible and secure - which you just can't get with any other form of travel money".
